From The Surveyors Perspective

"If only you could see what I have seen..." I am going to start submitting pictures of issues I have found for your entertainment and education. The picture is usually a "what the heck" moment.

This month's photos is are of failed raw water impellers:

The raw water impeller is a rubber star shaped part that pumps coolant water through your marine engine. Raw water impellers are found on all Diesel and Gas marine engines and Outboard motors. Most engine manufacturers recommend replacing your impellers every 3 years or sooner. Replacing raw water impellers is considered routine maintenance. Failure to replace impellers at recommended schedules can lead to a deteriorated and failed impellers. When the impellers disintegrate they no longer pump water through your engine, leading to a major engine overheat event. A major overheat to the engine can crack the head or blow out the head gasket

around the water jackets. If the head gasket is blown, water can enter a cylinder and cause hydro-lock. Since you can't compress water an engine will often suffer a bent connecting rod. An engine can also seize up from an overheat event. All too often a boat owner will file an insurance claim stating that they "sucked something into the strainer or ran over a bag". When Damage Surveyors inspect the torn down engine and we see a deteriorated impeller we are not buying into "sucked something up or ran over a plastic bag story". The cause of loss is failure to replace the raw water impellers within the last three years. If you don't have a receipt for an impeller replacement, the loss is on you. The claim is often turned down do to "deferred maintenance" on behalf of the owner. When dealing with insurance companies, "I didn't know I was supposed to do that" does not relieve the owner of routine maintenance responsibilities. Your best insurance is to replace the impellers regularly.

A BIT OF BYC HISTORY:

BYC-The Prequel

While researching something else in the pages of The Brockport Republic, I came upon a notice about one of our founding members. "George Guelf has commened the construction of a large and fine sail boat" (7/31/1890). Two weeks later more detail was provided. "George Guelf is constructing at his home on Union Street a neat sailboat. It is secenteeent foot long and eight foot beam, has an iron centreboard, and with the eighteen foot boom will carry a large spread of canvas. It will also have a gib [sic.]. It bears the name 'Lavinae.' The owner expects to place the boat in the lake tomorrow." When BYC was founded in 1904, Guelf was the first fleet captain. This boat, however, is not on the initial roster of yachts, He was commodore in 1905, 1912-13, and 1936-42. It is said he kept the club alive during the Depression by paying the taxes and doing much of the maintenance.
