COMMODORE"S CORNER



Up until this year, I have only used the phrase "God willing and the creek don't rise" as a metaphor in conversation. These days it is much more of a literal state-

ment. Unfortunately, I will not be at the general meeting this month. When we planned a trip to visit family in Nova Scotia last year, I didn't clear it with Mother Nature; Lesson learned.

As I'm sure you have heard by now, I had to make the decision to cancel the season at BYC. While I certainly didn't want to do it, the facts and forecast made the decision obvious. Thank you to everyone who emailed and called to express their support. I truly appreciate it.

Looking forward, we are in a unique position to repair and improve the club in ways that we generally would not have considered in the past. At the general meeting next week, you will hear from Tom Pavone of our engineering team. Tom along with his fellow team members Todd Dunn, David Manning, Bob Burkhart, and Larry Beneway have put a great deal of time and effort into what has become a much larger scope than just looking at stabilizing the building. They got a lot more than they bargained for and deserve everyone's gratitude. Countless hours have been spent on this situation thus far with countless more to go.

Next week you will hear the outline of a plan that includes not only the building but also the seawall, jetty, and docks. They are looking at this as a long-term plan with immediate needs and things that can be done over the next several years. Along those same lines will be a plan to pay for those repairs including options for grants and other funds to help offset the expense. This month's meeting will also include the final bylaw change vote to increase the maximum capital contribution to \$250 and eliminate the overall fund cap. This will help facilitate the budgeting for many of the repairs in the future and allow for better long term financial planning. In addition, it allows us to easily vote to move excess funds from this year's budget into the capital fund to cover some of the repair and improvements.

None of it will be cheap and certainly not easy. That said for the good of the club I believe that these are things that need to be done to ensure that the club is here for the next 113 years.

FLEET CAPTAIN

I wish I could offer better news, but the club is still a mess. I want to pass along a report from June 20th courtesy of Kevin Traut:

- Water level appears to be down about 1"
- Road still closed
- With all wind and rain in Hamlin, over



6" rain in last week, I found over *half the fleet* had clogged scuppers and most had 4-5" standing water in the cockpit.

• I cleared the scuppers on all affected and got water

flowing, but many had so much leaf debris that this will have to be done again soon. Strongly suggest anyone who hasn't been to club in last few days to check their bilges for flooding, especially anyone on Pearson row.

Please thank Kevin when you see him. I wholeheartedly agree with him that everyone needs to continue to check on their vessel routinely. When you do, please park out by the parkway and walk in.

With the docks being underwater for some time now, we should expect that significant repairs will be required when they do re-surface. We are investigating longterm solutions including converting to floating docks. This is not an inexpensive solution, but savings can be made if the membership performs the labor. Should the season be officially cancelled at the June meeting, you should expect that one of the many summer projects at the club will be to at least repair if not convert each and every dock. This is a large task and will likely span many summer weekends. Like the sandbag work parties, your participation in these upcoming work parties is essential to the success of the club. I know that with team work we can bring the club back, even if only one dock at a time.

From The Surveyors Perspective

If only you could see what I have seen..." I am going to start submitting pictures of issues I have found for your entertainment and education. The picture is usually a "what the heck" moment. This month's photo is of an abandoned Fuel fill fitting and fuel vent hose. The vessel had twin fuel tanks and the owner removed one of the tanks (leaking) figuring one good tank will be enough. This is how they left the abandoned fuel fill. The cap to the fitting was labeled GAS. Imagine if the owner pulled up to a marina and went into the store asking that the boat fuel be topped off ! The gas dock attendant sees a deck fitting marked GAS, unscrews it and inserts the nozzle then starts pumping !! 100 gallons of gas later, the bilge pump fires up and starts pumping gas from the bilges into the lake (provided no spark set the gas off) !!! Don't do this !!!! Leave a short piece of hose on the abandoned fill fitting and double clamp a wooden or rubber plug into the short piece of hose that will prevent the nozzle from being inserted. Better yet remove the fuel fitting and glass over the hole.

MORE FROM THE COMMODORE:

Greetings,

As of today the lake level is 248.58' (<u>http://lre-wm.usace.army.mil/reports/GreatLakes/GLWL-CurrentMonth-Feet.pdf</u>). The elevation of the south lawn and blah blah tree is at 247.8', the elevation of the sea wall varies from 248' to 248.5'. The "dance floor" on the main finger pier sits at 247.6'. Sandy Harbor Drive has high and low points within these same ranges. The Army Corps forecast is a drop of approximately 6" by July 16th (<u>http://www.lre.usace.army.mil/Missions/Great-Lakes-Information/Great-Lakes-Water-Levels/Water-Level-Forecast/Weekly-Great-Lakes-Water-Levels/) which still leave the lake at 248' give or take by mid-July. The current outflow is at its maximum according to news reports (<u>http://</u>buffalonews.com/2017/06/22/lake-ontario-water-levels-fall-record-outflows-continue/).</u>

Absent of any storms or winds, the best possible scenario according to the Army Corps forecast is that portions of the club grounds and a majority of the docks will still be under water in mid-July. In addition, we will not be able to address the full extent of the damage to the club until the water recedes even further.

Based on these facts and discussions with the Eboard, regretfully I have made the decision to cancel launch and haul for the season.
