FROM THE SURVEYOR'S PERSPECTIVE:

BYC Survives 2020

By all accounts 2020 was a challenging year for all of us. Truth be told, it wasn't as bad as 2017 when we were completely flooded and could not launch our boats at all. Still ...

2020 was a year like no other.

In March and April Lake Ontario water levels were 4" to 6" (record highs) higher than the 2019 levels for March and April, which were higher than the 100 year flood of 2017. We were flooded in 2019 until July although we did get to launch our boats. The upper Great lakes were at record highs in 2020, including Lake Erie which drains into Lake Ontario unchecked. We did not know then whether we would flood again as we did in 2019. Fortunately we did not flood, but that was not apparent until May.

The parking lot and yard was an unfinished mess form the Flood Remediation project. The new Creekside visitors dock was still just a wish on the yet-to-be completed list and paving blocks sat on pallets awaiting placement.

Along comes COVID-19, mandated shutdowns and gathering restrictions. We carefully navigated the gathering restrictions and used small (6 and under) work parties to further work on the completion of the flood project. We delayed launch for a couple of weeks into mid-May and did our best to operate launch within some semblance of COVID restrictions. Again successfully. As New York "flattened the curve" and the state started loosening gathering restrictions, we contacted the State's local restriction manager Bob Duffy and applied to begin our race program in mid-June which was granted. The race program went well albeit with a smaller fleet. Thanks Bill Topping.

With gathering restrictions eased a bit we were able to complete our Flood Remediation project. This included a new Creekside visitors dock, raising the parking lot elevation by a foot and a half in some spots, and raising the yard elevation by a foot or more. We did a final grade and seeded the yard. We laid patio block walkways and a south side patio which looks great. The difference between the grounds from spring to now is incredible. The Flood Remediation project took two and a half years and should keep us dry up to epic flood levels. While most of the club participated in Remediation work parties, we should thank Dave Manning, Larry Beneway, John Saucke, and Jeff Spring for their tenacity in making this project happen. And Thanks to all members who volunteered with the many work parties to make our Remediation Project a success.

Using an abundance of caution and paying attention to frequently changing gathering guidelines, we held our monthly General Meetings on Zoom virtually and dispensed with our usual club social parties. We are happy to say that we are unaware of any of our members having contracted COVID-19. BYC never became a hot spot.

We managed a successful haul-out in October.

As we lost corporate members to natural attrition such as members going Senior, relocations etc., we added 6 new corporate members in 2020 and still have some interested parties. Our Corporate membership numbers have stabilized at around 90 with four active Special Members. That maybe a feat in itself considering the circus that has been 2020.

Overall BYC managed to have a good year even though our social program took a heavy hit, in spite of all the challenges that 2020 threw at us. Many thanks to the Officer corps who patiently dealt with the many constantly moving obstacles and challenges of 2020. While we may have to continue to hold our Virtual General Meetings on Zoom until late spring, hopefully our summer social schedule will return to normal in 2021. I don't think any of us mind seeing 2020 in our rearview mirror, but we can feel better that we made the best of it.

Project Description: The Department has made a tentative determination to issue a Freshwater Wetland Permit to the Monroe County Water Authority for the temporary disturbance of approximately 6,400 square feet (sq ft) due to <u>demolition of a 9,000 sq foot building, cement pads, and a water tower at the Brockport Water Treatment Plant.</u> The file is available for review digitally upon request.

Availability of Application Documents: Filed application documents, and Department draft permits where applicable, are available for inspection during normal business hours at the address of the contact person. To ensure timely service at the time of inspection, it is recommended that an appointment be made with the contact person.

State Environmental Quality Review (SEQR) Determination: Project is not subject to SEQR because it is a Type II action.

SEQR Lead Agency: None Designated State Historic Preservation Act (SHPA) Determination: The proposed activity is not

subject to review in accordance with SHPA. The application type is exempt and/or the project involves the continuation of

an existing operational activity.

Coastal Management: This project is not located in a Coastal Management area and is not subject to the Waterfront Revitalization and Coastal Resources Act.

DEC Commissioner Policy 29, Environmental Justice and Permitting (CP-29) It has been determined that the proposed action is not subject to CP-29.

EDITOR'S TRUE POOP DECK:

This will be sort of a *Tech Tidbit* item and suggestion.

Engine oil should be changed at the end of the boating season in both outboards (4 stroke) and inboards. During the combustion process there are many harmful compounds that will form in the oil. Some of these are acidic. You do not want these sitting in your engine's sump, just eating away at the soft Babbitt bearings and the steel of the crankshaft. Changing the oil will prevent this from occurring.

On to 2 stroke outboards. While there is not an engine oil sump that requires an oil change, there is the lower unit gearbox. This oil should be changed, also. Here the issue is water contamination. If the prop seal is worn/damaged and lets water into the gear case, bad things will happen. A simple, inexpensive device is available that makes this task much easier. It is a pump that cost \$5 and screws right onto the gear oil container. (See photo at right.) Drain the oil from the gear case, screw the plastic tip into the lower drain hole, pump until oil comes out the oil level screw hole, and viola, filled lower unit. No fuss, no mess.

Oil is cheap insurance.

As another piece of information, I attended a talk by Joe Valentine, a researcher for an oil company. His presentation of a paper to antique car restorers was on why not to add "topping oil" to gas (4 stroke engines). He simply gave all of the evidence of what deleterious events will befall those that perform this "old wives tale" myth. He went on to point out that engine manufacturers go to great lengths to keep oil OUT of the combustion chamber. So why add a problem? (I can send you a brief of the paper, if you wish.)

List of General Practices regarding Covid-19

If you are not feeling well, stay away from the club at least 14 days.

- If you have been around someone who you may believe has contracted Covid, stay away from the club for at least 14 days.
- If you have been overseas in the last 14 days, stay away from the club.
- Have your own face covering/PPE/mask on your person at all times at the club. If you can't maintain social distancing of 6 feet, put it on. This is applicable to all areas of the club, including boats, pavillion, gazebo, clubhouse and the grounds.
- Restroom usage includes cleaning up after yourself. There are supplies. At a minimum, it means:
 - Clean the toilet seat after
 - Flush until the bowl is clean
 - Put the lid down
 - Wash your hands thoroughly with soap
 - Use the hand sanitizer
- The conventional race season is postponed until July 1st and will be revisited then. The committee boat is not to be used for racing. No flags, trophies or scoring of formal races until then. The Commodore Review and Memorial Day Race events are cancelled.
- General membership meetings will be held by ZOOM until the social distancing guidelines are removed.
- The club will not supply food and drink. Personal food and drink can be served/ eaten at the club as long as these general practices are followed.
- If you use kitchen items or the picnic tables, thoroughly clean them before and immediately after use. Wash your hands thoroughly beforehand. Throw out all trash, leave nothing behind.
- If you are uncomfortable with not being able to follow any of these general practices, stay away from the club.
