Start your countdown to launch! I think we're all ready for boating season after being holed up inside all these months.

Launch is still planned for May 3rd; the launch order and job list will be sent out soon. If you don't see your name on the job list don't worry; help is always needed moving jack stands and doing other tasks. It would be super helpful to the club if boats on trailers that will not be using the crane to launch be moved out of the parking lot before launch in order to make room for the crane.

If you have a dock on the West side of the basin make sure to claim your fender board before launch; many were moved during dock work parties. If there are any missing/loose deck boards on docks where the majority of the winter work parties focused on I will address those prior to launch.

Boat owners who tie dock lines to poles with electrical conduit on them will now be able to use the newly installed 8" t-cleats on the docks. This will prevent damage to the electrical wiring.

SOCIAL COMMITTEE

The BYC dinner meeting this Thursday April 24th will be the last gathering at



Fosters restaurant. The owner/chef, Steve Spotts, is retiring this summer. The BYC officers are

planning on Fosters not being available next year. We have been researching new venues and options for next year's 2026 winter dinner meetings. No decisions for 2026 BYC dinner meetings have been decided yet.

For this year, the four BYC winter din-

ners are the lowest attendance for the ten years we have been keeping records. The statistical part of me created a chart of month vs BYC dinner reservations. With 95% confidence (α =.05), the 2025 BYC winter dinner attendance is significantly lower than the previous years.


There are some assignable causes. Members come after the dinner to attend the meeting. The April meeting had seventeen members arrive to the meeting, but did not attend the dinner. Members participate in the meeting by Zoom from remote locations. The April meeting had ten members participate by Zoom. Only twenty five members attended the dinner prior to the meeting. So, there was a minority of members at the meeting that paid for a dinner, which pays for the venue.

The attendance emphasis should always be on the meetings, more than the dinners. But low dinner attendance weakens our negotiations for reserving a venue for next year's 2026 winter meetings. We have found that many restaurants ask for a minimum of forty dinners. Our ten year average for winter dinner reservations is 35 and our 2025 average is 28. This is a mute point for the remainder of this year's BYC dinner meetings that will be held at the clubhouse. But low attendance at winter dinner meetings will have a significant impact on where we can meet next year.

The upside is, for the remainder of this year, all dinner meetings will be at the BYC club house, catered by Jim Kolb's Colby Catering. We are recruiting volunteers at the fire pit to provide Troy's flame broiled chicken wings. I look forward to meeting each of you at future BYC meetings.







Releasing of Steelhead Fingerlings

This past Saturday, a group of volunteers met at the yacht club to release the 15,000 steelhead fingerlings contained in the 3 pens tied along the seawall. The fingerlings, when first added to the pen, were less than 2". After 4 weeks they grew to almost 6". The pens were equipped with automatic feeders, turning on every 4 hours. Members of the group came down daily to refill the feeders. The fingerlings were kept in 3 pens. Our illustrious Rear Commodore Jude was part of the crew helping to release them.

They started, at Jude's suggestion, with moving a floater to the seawall to facilitate a stable(ish) platform to work on. One by one, they untied a pen and tied it alongside the floater. The frame holding the top screen was tie-wrapped to the frame. Adventurous folks laid on the frame and cut the tie-wraps holding the lid. Once the lid was removed and handed up to folks in the parking lot. A bunch of guys lined up on the floater, grabbed the top rail, and proceeded to flip the pens upside down, so the fish were free to swim out the bottom. As each pen was emptied, it was staged further up the seawall.


After all 3 pens were empty, Jude grabbed the straps from the floor of the clubhouse, and then directed a team to float the pens back, drop the straps (attached to the lifting frame) under the pen. The crane had no problem lifting the empty pen to the parking lot. Once out of the water, the guys cut the tie-wraps holding the netting in place – leaving the pen an empty frame. They came with a big flatbed trailer to haul the frames.

The crew started a little after noon, and all pens were empty around 12:30. It was quite an interesting operation to witness. In a way, it reminded me of a BYC work party. Lots of folks were there to help -I hit a count of 30 – and most were involved.

Boating Safety Course Requirements

REMINDER: In New York State, all motorized boats, including sailboats with motors, require a certified operator. This is due to Brianna's Law, which requires operators to complete a boating safety course and obtain a certificate from the NYS Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation. The law began being phased in on January 1, 2020, with full compliance required by January 1, 2025, regardless of age.

Persons of all ages will be required to obtain a New York Boater Safety Education Certificate as of January 2025 Submitted by Jeff Spring

BoatUS: New U.S. Coast Guard Fire Extinguisher Regulation Effective April 2022

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Feb. 15, 2022 – A rite of passage for every boater is the annual spring commissioning. Newly added to the boat owners to-do list this spring will be to check all disposable (non-rechargeable) fire extinguisher dates of manufacture, as well as the label for their U.S. Coast Guard classification.

That's because a new U.S. Coast Guard regulation beginning April 20 for disposable fire extinguishers mandates a 12-year expiration date from the date of manufacture. Boaters can find the manufacture date stamped into the bottom of the bottle or near the UL label. This may be two or four digits — if it is two, as in 08, that means 2008. Additionally, while the new regulation does not change the type (U.S. Coast Guard-rated) or quantity or requirement for USCG approved fire extinguishers aboard, it does specify the minimum Underwriter Laboratory (UL) classification of extinguishers to be carried aboard certain vessels — depending on the boat's model year.

This is the result of phasing out older "B-I" and "B-II" labels for newer "5-B" "10-B" and "20-B" extinguisher classifications. The number in this new rating refers to the size in square feet of the potential fire the device is suitable to extinguish and not the exact weight of the dry chemical inside the bottle.

Vessels on the water today that are less than 26 feet and model year 2017 or older may continue to carry older, dated or undated "B-I" or "B-II" disposable extinguishers. However, when they are no longer serviceable or have reached 12 years of age since manufacture, they must be replaced with newer class "5-B" or greater extinguishers. Boats less than 26 feet and 2018 model year or newer must carry unexpired "5-B" "10-B" or "20-B" fire extinguishers. Having older "B-I" and "B-II" types do not meet the new carriage requirements.

Many retailers today offer "10-B" class fire extinguishers, which may be a good choice as they exceed U.S. Coast Guard minimum carriage requirements for boats under 26 feet, while at the same time giving boaters more extinguishing coverage. For boats 26 feet or greater, however, having one "10-B" aboard does not equal two 5-Bs. Only a "20-B" classification meets the requirement to carry two "5-B" extinguishers. For a look at how many and what type of fire extinguishers are needed aboard all recreational boats up to 65 feet, go to BoatUS.org/Fire-Extinguishers.

BoatUS strongly recommends going beyond the regulation's minimum requirements. The results from a Foundation-sponsored boat burn showed that one extinguisher may give very little time to make an emergency call or potentially prepare to abandon your vessel.

BoatUS also notes that most U.S. Coast Guard disposables on the market today carry at least a dual B:C rating, able to douse both liquids and electrical fires, and some boat owners wisely prefer triple rated A:B:C extinguishers, adding a third protection for combustible fires.

To be serviceable, a portable extinguisher must have a pressure gauge indicating an operable range, lock pin firmly installed, clean discharge nozzle, and no significant corrosion or damage. Some more recently manufactured portable fire extinguishers aboard boats today may carry both old and new labeling, for example, having simultaneous "B-I" and "5-B" classifications.

There are no changes to rechargeable or fixed-mount (i.e., engine room) extinguisher regulations. They continue to require regular maintenance and servicing, typically done annually by a technician.

"This new U.S. Coast Guard expiration date regulation aligns with the 12-years recommended by the National Fire Protection Association," said BoatUS Foundation Assistant Director of Boating Safety Ted Sensenbrenner. "We expect that the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary and United States Power Squadrons vessel safety check program will soon include this new regulation as part of their free, no-penalty vessel exams. Because this change affects a critical piece of safety equipment aboard your boat, we also expect the U.S. Coast Guard will initially focus on education. You may want to start checking extinguishers now while your boat may be ashore this winter."

Sensenbrenner adds, "Also take a look now to ensure your fire extinguishers are readily accessible. You can buy only the bracket if you don't have one and mount your extinguishers where they need to be — at points of egress, at the helm, and near the engine and fuel supply. Burying them in the bottom of a compartment ensures they will be hard to reach when you need them the most. Familiarizing yourself with the PASS method (Pull, Aim, Squeeze, and Sweep) will prepare you for fighting a small fire aboard."



The interior has been renovated and the cushions are in good shape. The bottom paint (fresh in June, 2024) is fine for at least another season. There is an enclosed marine head with a holding tank. Items in very good condition include a standing headroom Bimini top that covers the cockpit, life vests, anchor, throw-able cushions and more.
