What does the BYC Social Committee do for dinner meetings?

For the BYC Social Committee, there are three types of dinner meetings. They are Winter, Summer & Fall. At these gatherings, the Social Committee arranges a dinner and the BYC Executive Board (officers & trustees) run the business meeting.

For the Winter months (Jan, Feb, Mar, & Apr) we secure a venue and meal. The BYC club house is closed (no running water or toilets). There is no parking, because all the boats are hauled and fill the parking lot. For the past several years, the Winter dinner meetings have been held at Fosters restaurant Hilton, NY. This venue was chosen by the Social Committee Chairs (Jack Evans & Jeff Spring)

long before Dave Wright & I took charge of the Social Committee. Unfortunately, Steve Spotts, the owner/chef at Fosters, is retiring this year. Fosters may not be available for next year, 2026. The BYC executive board & I are researching alternative meeting venues and meal options for next year. No decisions have been made regarding a future venue for BYC meetings, so all options are being considered.

For the Summer months (June, July & August), the dinner meetings are held at the BYC club. Our first meeting at the club is held shortly after the club opening in May. The dinners are catered by Colbys, owned by Jim Kolb, who is a BYC member. BYC Social Committee members prepare 40 lbs. of sauced chicken wings on a charcoal grill for pre-dinner hors d'oeuvres.

For the Fall meetings (Sept. & Oct.), the dinner is prepared by the Social Commit-

tee, again at the club. For Sept., we prepare and serve a steak meal, with our BYC chicken wings. For Oct., the entire membership is invited to share an all day cooking event to prepare and serve a traditional corned beef and cabbage meal. The meeting closes with our annual Club membership photo. Shortly after our last Oct. meeting, we close the club for the winter.

We invite all members, corporate, special or senior, to come share a good time at a BYC dinner meeting. You do not have to attend the dinner to attend the meeting, but you'll enjoy the fellowship at the dinner.

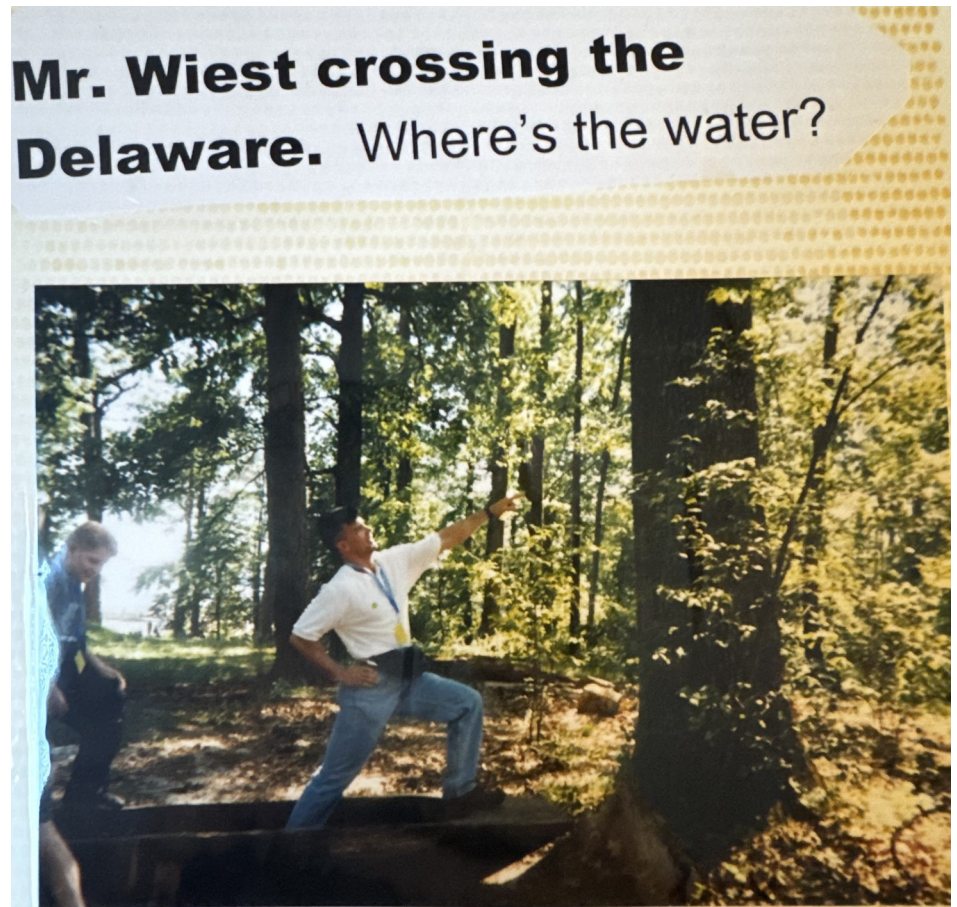
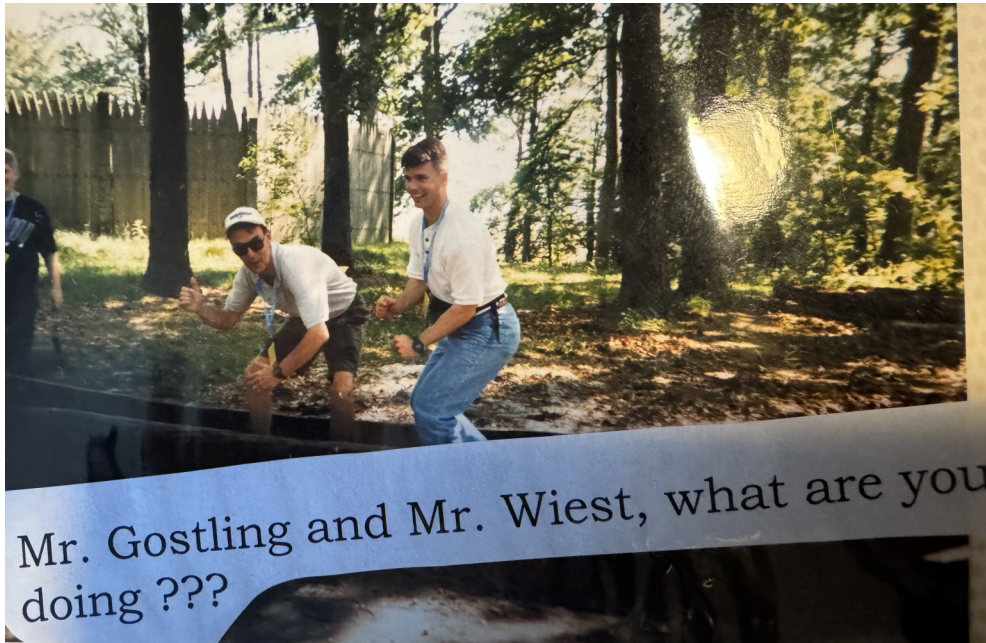

NEW INSURANCE REQUIREMENT

I have been pleasantly surprised by the number of insurance certificates that have been sent in. To date I have received close to half of the fleet. For anyone who missed it, we are now required to have proof of insurance for any boat that is docked at the club. The process is simple. Reach out to your insurance broker or carrier and ask them to add Brockport Yacht Club as an “additional interest” on your insurance policy. There should be no cost to do this and in most cases can be done online or with a phone call. We need to have these prior to launch. You are only required to carry liability insurance to comply with facility usage policy. Hull insurance is completely optional and up to each boat owner. 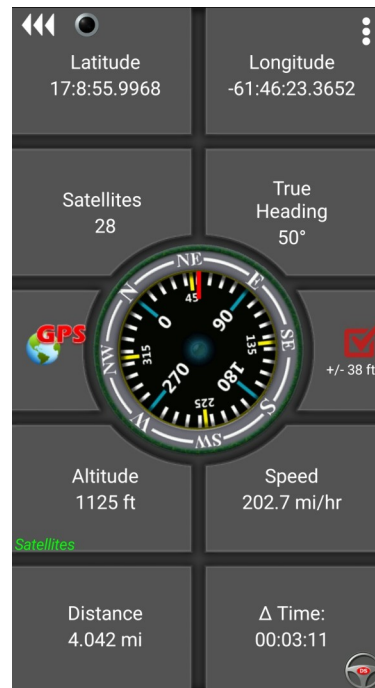

In the August 2021 edition of the Porthole, I shared information about a GPS navigation app (in your app store, search for Polaris navigation GPS). I use it frequently when we meet friends from PA for lunch and brewery and/or distillery hopping. When returning home once it gets dark, I find it handy to use the app along with the Waze navigation app. It's reassuring when Waze tells us to turn left on some nondescript road, I can verify using the GPS app that we are heading in the right direction. That said, I wondered how it works. Does it use cell towers for navigation – or is it actually picking up satellites?

We just came back from a trip to Antigua and during the flight, with my phone in airplane mode; I decided to try it out. It worked AWESOME! I brought up the flight information screen from the seatback monitor in front of me – and confirmed basic details like altitude, speed and direction. I didn't think to capture any screenshots while cruising at 35,000' – but I did grab one as we lifted off from Antigua.

Download the GPS app and give it a try alongside your favorite navigation app. It's quite an amazing tool.

Boating Safety Course Requirements

REMINDER: In New York State, all motorized boats, including sailboats with motors, require a certified operator. This is due to Brianna's Law, which requires operators to complete a boating safety course and obtain a certificate from the NYS Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation. The law began being phased in on January 1, 2020, with full compliance required by January 1, 2025, regardless of age.

Persons of all ages will be required to obtain a New York Boater Safety Education Certificate as of January 2025

BoatUS: New U.S. Coast Guard Fire Extinguisher Regulation Effective April 2022

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Feb. 15, 2022 – A rite of passage for every boater is the annual spring commissioning. Newly added to the boat owners to-do list this spring will be to check all disposable (non-rechargeable) fire extinguisher dates of manufacture, as well as the label for their U.S. Coast Guard classification.

That's because a new U.S. Coast Guard regulation beginning April 20 for disposable fire extinguishers mandates a 12-year expiration date from the date of manufacture. Boaters can find the manufacture date stamped into the bottom of the bottle or near the UL label. This may be two or four digits — if it is two, as in 08, that means 2008. Additionally, while the new regulation does not change the type (U.S. Coast Guard-rated) or quantity or requirement for USCG approved fire extinguishers aboard, it does specify the minimum Underwriter Laboratory (UL) classification of extinguishers to be carried aboard certain vessels — depending on the boat's model year.

This is the result of phasing out older "B-I" and "B-II" labels for newer "5-B" "10-B" and "20-B" extinguisher classifications. The number in this new rating refers to the size in square feet of the potential fire the device is suitable to extinguish and not the exact weight of the dry chemical inside the bottle.

Vessels on the water today that are less than 26 feet and model year 2017 or older may continue to carry older, dated or undated "B-I" or "B-II" disposable extinguishers. However, when they are no longer serviceable or have reached 12 years of age since manufacture, they must be replaced with newer class "5-B" or greater extinguishers. Boats less than 26 feet and 2018 model year or newer must carry unexpired "5-B" "10-B" or "20-B" fire extinguishers. Having older "B-I" and "B-II" types do not meet the new carriage requirements.

Many retailers today offer "10-B" class fire extinguishers, which may be a good choice as they exceed U.S. Coast Guard minimum carriage requirements for boats under 26 feet, while at the same time giving boaters more extinguishing coverage. For boats 26 feet or greater, however, having one "10-B" aboard does not equal two 5-Bs. Only a "20-B" classification meets the requirement to carry two "5-B" extinguishers. For a look at how many and what type of fire extinguishers are needed aboard all recreational boats up to 65 feet, go to BoatUS.org/Fire-Extinguishers.

BoatUS strongly recommends going beyond the regulation's minimum requirements. The results from a Foundation-sponsored boat burn showed that one extinguisher may give very little time to make an emergency call or potentially prepare to abandon your vessel.

BoatUS also notes that most U.S. Coast Guard disposables on the market today carry at least a dual B:C rating, able to douse both liquids and electrical fires, and some boat owners wisely prefer triple rated A:B:C extinguishers, adding a third protection for combustible fires.

To be serviceable, a portable extinguisher must have a pressure gauge indicating an operable range, lock pin firmly installed, clean discharge nozzle, and no significant corrosion or damage. Some more recently manufactured portable fire extinguishers aboard boats today may carry both old and new labeling, for example, having simultaneous "B-I" and "5-B" classifications.

There are no changes to rechargeable or fixed-mount (i.e., engine room) extinguisher regulations. They continue to require regular maintenance and servicing, typically done annually by a technician.

"This new U.S. Coast Guard expiration date regulation aligns with the 12-years recommended by the National Fire Protection Association," said BoatUS Foundation Assistant Director of Boating Safety Ted Sensenbrenner. "We expect that the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary and United States Power Squadrons vessel safety check program will soon include this new regulation as part of their free, no-penalty vessel exams. Because this change affects a critical piece of safety equipment aboard your boat, we also expect the U.S. Coast Guard will initially focus on education. You may want to start checking extinguishers now while your boat may be ashore this winter."

Sensenbrenner adds, "Also take a look now to ensure your fire extinguishers are readily accessible. You can buy only the bracket if you don't have one and mount your extinguishers where they need to be — at points of egress, at the helm, and near the engine and fuel supply. Burying them in the bottom of a compartment ensures they will be hard to reach when you need them the most. Familiarizing yourself with the PASS method (Pull, Aim, Squeeze, and Sweep) will prepare you for fighting a small fire aboard."

- 2016 - Quantum mainsail. 1 full batten, 1 reef point, draft stripes. Maybe used 10 times. We can negotiate keeping this with the boat or I can include the original main and sell the new sail separately.

The boat can sleep three but is ideal for a couple for cruising. The electric wiring is shot, but we used a Jackery and all USB lighting and accessory power. The kitchen is rudimentary. There is a fresh water tank but it is not set up. We used it like a basic camper and used the shore facilities along the canal.

While the boat is free, we would like to recoup some of the fit-out costs. The motor and the equipment are not included for the zero dollar price. The motor is a 2024 Tohatsu 9.8 hp and would be about half of the original price (\$2900 new). The gear is new in 2024 and would be about \$500. New 2024 gear includes a hand-held VHF radio, fenders, boat hooks, FM Bluetooth radio, signal devices, and more. Items in very good condition include a standing headroom Bimini top that covers the cockpit, life vests, anchor, throw-able cushions and more.

We will post this on Facebook Marketplace later this week. Let us know if you are interested. For about \$2000 you could spend a number of weeks cruising the Erie canal, fully fitted out for the summer. We doubt anyone from the club will want it, but it would be a shame if someone did and missed the posting.

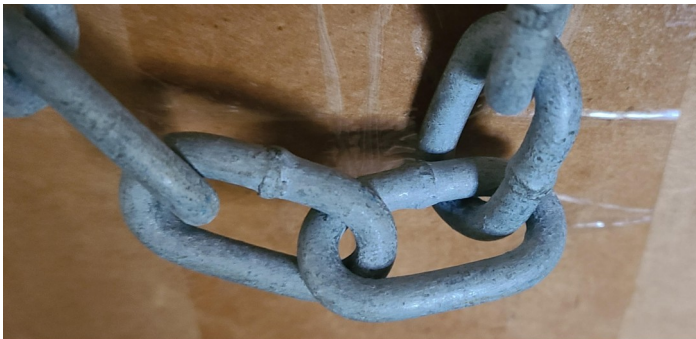
